Rules & Regulations

- Exhibitors are requested to read carefully all general, entry and exhibit, livestock and division rules and regulations.
- An exhibitor can only weigh-in a maximum of two animals at the pre-fair weigh-in, with only one selected from the two as their market animal. A family can weigh in a single back-up to be shared by the siblings in that family only. (4H/FFA family members backup exceptions)
- Exhibitors can weigh-in as many carcass animals as desired but must be tagged at the pre-fair weigh-in.
- Exhibits may be delivered after 7 a.m. and must be in place by noon on Tuesday, opening day of the fair and must remain in place until 4:30 p.m. Sunday, the last day of the Fair.
- All exhibits entered must be a project in the Agriculture Education Department and must be a dues paid FFA member.
- **No exhibitor may exhibit the same project in both 4-H and FFA.**
- Any FFA Exhibitor may make as many entries in a class as he or she wishes, but may be awarded only two premiums.
- In case there is no competition or the same entries are deemed unworthy of the prize offered, the premium will be awarded at the discretion of the superintendents if age groups are closed together and small numbers of exhibits make it necessary for a good class to judge.
- When funds are available, all premium money will be paid on the point system. A pool of money from both the FFA and 4-H allotments will be combined and the value of each point will be determined after the points awarded have been totaled for the livestock.
- Animals must meet health requirements approved by advisors before being admitted to fair.
- All animals are subject to inspection by the veterinarians in attendance upon admission to exhibition grounds. No animals shall be admitted to or allowed to remain on the grounds that shows evidence of any infectious or contagious disease or any unsightly disease condition such as warts, ringworm, lamb fungus, prolapse, etc. The management reserves the right to require inspection, diagnosis test, treatment and/or other disease control measures or procedures which might become necessary in emergencies.
- Animals not passing health inspection by the local veterinarian must be immediately removed from the fairgrounds or exhibition area.
- FFA Grievance Committee is set up to consider complaints and student problems regarding FFA rules and policies. The committee will consider issues and make recommendations on a case-by-case basis and all decisions are final.
- Master Showmanship and livestock judging contest animals will be selected by advisors. Any FFA animal can be used for these contests. All effort will be given to notify the exhibitor of the use of their animal.
- Animals must be shown in either a breeding or market exhibit.

- Exhibitor Fees must be paid before the start of Fair: (payable to DC4-HA)
 - Large **\$10/Specie/Exhibitor**
 - Small **\$5/specie/Exhibitor**
- All exhibitors must compete in showmanship, herdsmanship, turn in a completed record book and participate in the livestock judging contest. (seniors are not required to judge, but must help in running the contest). Exception will be given to small animal exhibitors.
- Exhibitors are allowed to have assistance by other current 4-H/FFA members for market and breeding shows only. No assistance will be allowed for showmanship day.
- Exhibitor must exhibit an animal within a specie to exhibit any animal in that specie at state fair.
- Students may exhibit at county and state fair for only the year of their high school graduation.
- All FFA members, and their parents, exhibiting at state fair are responsible for reading and adhering to the state fair rules and guidelines found in the State Fair Premium Book.
- Animals exhibited at state fair must be in the exhibitor's possession 60 days prior to the move-in date of fair.

Leasing Animals

- All breeding animals exhibited (owned and leased) must have been carried as an FFA project by the exhibitor since:
 - Beef – County Beef Steer Tagging Date
 - Sheep, Goats & Swine – May 15th
 - Rabbits & Poultry – June 1st (or given a delivery date for ages of pens)
- A written agreement between the FFA members and the breeder/owner must be found in the Exhibitor's Record Book
- Registered animals must be registered in the name of exhibitor. (Registration in a partnership or family name is acceptable if the FFA member's animals have been designated at the beginning of the project)

Penalties:

- If a member is found not abiding by the rules and/or lease agreement he/she will not receive premiums and will not be allowed to show at the county fair.
- If legality of lease or ownership arises, premiums will be held until reviewed by the grievance committee.
- If the leased/owned animal is shown by a person other than the lessee/owner within the project period, member will forfeit the right to show the following year.

FFA Parental Codes of Conduct

The Bend and Redmond FFA Chapters adheres to strict codes of conduct for members, volunteers, and parents at county and state fair. The following behavior expectations are provided for parents whose children (biological, under guardianship or other form of care) are enrolled in either FFA program.

- Treat FFA Advisors, FFA representatives, parents, children and others in a courteous, respectful manner demonstrating behaviors appropriate for a positive role model for youth.
- Abide by policies and guidelines of the FFA program.
- Obey all laws of the locality, state, and nation, including those related to the use of illegal substances, or use of firearms.
- Recognize that actual or threatened verbal, sexual, emotional, neglectful, or physical abuse of FFA Advisors, FFA representatives, parents, youth or others is unacceptable in the FFA program.
- Treat animals humanely and teach your children appropriate animal care.
- Penalty: Violation of Code of Conduct may result in your removal and/or your FFA members' projects removed from fair.

FFA Exhibitor Codes of Conduct

General Expectation:

- Obey all school rules as listed in the student handbook.
 - ✓ Any school violation will be handled by the advisor and/or school administration and may include removal of projects from fairgrounds.
- Obey all fair rules as listed in the fair premium book.
 - ✓ Any fair rule violation will be handled by the FFA advisors and 4-H coordinators and may include removal of projects from fairgrounds.
- Obey all FFA chapter rules as outlined in the chapter constitution.
 - ✓ Any chapter rule violation will be handled by the advisor and may include removal of projects from fairgrounds.

Specific Expectation:

- Every member is expected to help setup and help clean up their barn(s)
- Each barn will have a designated time to arrive each morning and a specific time to feed; don't be tardy.
- Each member will spend equal time on "Barn Duty" in their barn, and each barn will set their own barn duty schedule.
- Each member must be chaperoned while exhibiting at county and state fair or staying overnight on the grounds. (*Chaperone: a responsible adult, over the age of 21, designated by the member's parent & approved by the member's advisor.*)
- Each member is under the advisor's supervision from the time he/she arrives at the fair each morning until 7:00 pm each night. After 7:00 pm they are the responsibility of their parents or fair chaperone.
- No member is allowed to leave the fairgrounds without permission from the advisor.
- Each member will conduct themselves in a professional and responsible manner in and out of the show ring. You will pay particular attention to how you represent yourself and the FFA in regards to:

✓Behavior

✓Animal Care

✓Language

✓Respect

✓Dress

✓General Conduct

FFA Fundraisers at Fair

- All exhibitors must participate in the fundraisers conducted at fair at least one day of the fair.
- Official dress must be worn while participating

Special Considerations:

- Chapters may conduct a chapter fundraiser governed by their constitution regulations

4-H & FFA Livestock Auction

General Understanding and Expectation:

- This Auction is a Terminal Auction
- All scales will be certified by the Oregon Department of Agriculture
- There are no weigh backs, only once across the scale.
- Judges decision is Final
- White ribbons do not sell

Market Steers:

- Must weigh between 1,100 and 1,450 lbs., live weight
- Steers will be evaluated live and grouped using the USDA Cattle Grading Standards:

Group 1. Blue Ribbon	Group 2. Red Ribbon	Group 3. White Ribbon

- Steer must be in the possession of 4-H and FFA exhibitors to participate in the pre-fair weigh-in, and not be over two years of age at the time of auction. Recommended weight at weigh-in: 750-850 pounds.
- Steers should be healed from castration at Pre-fair weigh-in.
- Only polled or dehorned (not over 2.5”) market steers will be admitted to the county fair.
- Members exhibiting market steers must turn in the following items when the steers are weighed at fair:
 - MOU
 - Unbranded steers:
 - Exemption certificate or brand inspection certificate.
 - Branded steers:
 - Bill of sale from original owner of the brand or brand inspection certificate.
 - Signed transportation slip
 - Quality Assurance Paper

Market Goats:

- Must weigh between 75 and 105 lbs., live weight
- Market Goats must be in the possession of 4-H and FFA exhibitors to participate in the pre-fair weigh-in, and not be over eight months of age at the time of auction.
- All Market Goats must have a collar on when picked up on Sunday. No twine, string or wire.
- No horns or scurs allowed.
- Market Goats should be body clipped.
- Wethers or does will be allowed.
- Born after Dec 1, of the previous year.
- Any breed or crossbred will be allowed.
- Class may be divided by weight if numbers warrant.
- Wethers should be healed from castration or must be banded at pre-fair weigh-in.
- MOU
- Turn in Country of Origin Affidavit and Quality Assurance Paper by/at fair weigh

Market Lambs:

- Must weigh between 110 and 150 pounds.
- Lambs will be evaluated live and group using the USDA Lamb Grading Standards:

- Lambs must be 12 months of age or less and should still have “lambs teeth”.
- Wethers should be healed from castration or must be “banded” prior to Pre-Fair weigh-in.
- Lamb must be in exhibitor’s possession by pre-fair weigh-in
- All market lambs must be tagged during pre-fair weigh-in.
- Recommended weight at Pre-Fair weigh-in: 60-80 pounds.
- Market Lambs must have a clipped fleece, not to exceed 1/2 inch. Lambs with long fleeces will not be allowed to enter the ring.
- MOU
- Turn in Country of Origin Affidavit and Quality Assurance Paper by/at fair weigh in.

Market Poultry:

- Market Poultry exhibits receiving a blue or red ribbon will be sold at auction. White ribbon pens will not be sold.
- MOU
- Market Birds will be weighed individually.
- All breeds compete together.
- Members may weigh-in up to 6 Chickens at pre-fair, but must pick a pen of 3 prior to fair weigh-in.
- Ages and Weights on Chickens:
 - Broiler/Fryer, pen of three (under 8 weeks) 4-6.5 pounds live wt. each.
 - Roaster, pen of three (8-16 weeks) 6 pounds live wt. or more.
- Members may weigh in up to 2 Toms or Hens at pre-fair weigh-in, but must pick only one (1) at fair.
- Ages & Weight of Turkeys:
 - Toms 5 months or younger at fair. 18-25 pounds
 - Hens, 5 1/2 months or younger. 14-24 pounds
 - Feeder Turkeys: Market turkeys not meeting the above criteria; will not sell at auction.

Market Rabbits:

- Judged on conformation and condition only, meat breeds only.
- MOU
- Pens are also evaluated on uniformity.
- A single fryer may be part of a pen of fryers, but must be permanently marked and identified on fair entry day.
- Failure to I.D. a single fryer from a pen at this time will result in a “No Show” for the single fryer class.
- Members may weigh in up to 6 market rabbits at pre-fair weigh-in, but must pick their pen of 3 prior to fair weigh-in.
- Ages and weights of Rabbits:
 - Fryer, 4 - 5.5 pounds each, under 80 days or younger at fair weigh-in.
 - Pen of three fryers, 4-5.5 pounds, 80 days at fair weigh-in.
 - Roaster, 5.5-7.5 lbs. each, 81-100 days at fair weigh-in.
 - Pen of Three Roasters, 5.5-7.5 lbs. each, 81-100 days at fair weigh-in

Market Hogs:

- Hogs must weigh between 230 and 290 pounds
- Hogs will be evaluated live and group using the USDA Hog Grading Standards:

- Barrows should be healed from castration and show no signs of prolapse or hernia.
- Hogs must have been in possession of the exhibitor and participated in pre-fair weigh-in. Recommended weight at Pre-Fair weigh-in: 110-140 pounds.

- ½” hair or more (at minimum)
